2A: Changing the Conversation about Pain: Using State of Oregon Tools for Pain Education for Clinicians and Patients to Make Your Job Easier

Nora Stern, MSPT Michelle Marikos, PSS Adrienne Scavera, MSW, PSS Andrew Suchocki, MD, MPH Randy Dittmar, PT Catriona Buist, PsyD

This session discusses the impact of pain education on care planning, introduces open-sourced educational material for patient pain education, created by the State of Oregon and used across disciplines, presents application of this content in an integrated primary care setting, a peer support training module, home health physical therapy, and an outpatient comprehensive pain center. We will share examples of scripting and workflow. Join the discussion with clinical, administrative and peer support innovators.

2B: Promoting Harm Reduction and Recovery in Rural Washington State Christal Eshelman, MPH, CPH Joseph Hunter

Implementation and evaluation of low-barrier community harm reduction services in rural communities. The session will include information on how to design and develop a Narcan vending machine program, low barrier evaluation design, initial results on utilization of machines and Narcan. Additionally we'll share success stories, lessons learned, and best practices identified to support program replication.

2C: Prevention Workforce Development Initiative in WA Sonja Pipek Jennifer Wilkins

Washington State has completed a number of initiatives throughout the state to support workforce development needs. Through various partnerships WA has been able to create a workforce ladder for prevention. By developing a Prevention Fellowship program and supporting other internship programs. WA state has seen positive outcomes from these programs that continue to support workforce needs in the state.

2D: The Power of the Pledge Annie Blake-Burke Esther Brown Michelle Hedge

The Pharmacy Safe Storage Program, piloted in 2020 and expanded to 20 pharmacies in 2021, uses the power of a pledge to encourage safe storage in communities across Washington. The program was developed as a part of the Washington State Health Care Authority's statewide opioid prevention campaign, Starts with One, and is designed to inform and educate Washington residents receiving prescription opioids about the importance of locking up their prescriptions. This presentation will share our model of partnering with local pharmacies and discuss the program's results, which underscore the power pharmacies have to help create a new social norm of safe storage in our communities.

2E: Initiating Buprenorphine at Home and in the Hospital in the Era of Fentanyl: Micro-dosing and Macro-dosing made simple Sarah Spencer, DO, FASAM

This session will discuss the identification of chronic fentanyl use and risk of associated precipitated withdrawal when initiating buprenorphine, as well as a number of varied protocols that can be utilized to initiate buprenorphine safely and comfortably in the inpatient or home setting, including the techniques of microdosing and macro-dosing.

Peer support specialists play an increasing role in a continuum of services, including post-overdose interventions, street outreach, and other approaches to engaging people who use drugs. This workshop will review the Peer Recovery Initiated in Medical Establishments + HCV/HIV Testing and Linkage to Treatment (PRIME+) project and discuss the new supportive approaches and highlight areas of ongoing need when considering implementing a peer program.

Building an Adolescent Recovery-Oriented System of Care Emily Hennesy, BA, MPhil, PhD

An adolescent-recovery oriented system of care (A-ROSC) acknowledges that youth experiencing a problem with alcohol and drug use need a variety of intervention, treatment, and follow-up services and that there should be multiple avenues to accessing these services. Key aspects of developing an A-ROSC can be considered from a Recovery Capital perspective, a perspective that considers all the resources needed for recovery, and barriers to accessing those resources. Using results from several research studies, this presentation will describe the key (1) values and principles, (2) services and supports, (3) infrastructure elements, and (4) potential outcomes of an A-ROSC that uses recovery capital as its foundation and how an A-ROSC can be developed to better serve the youth in their recovery experience.

4A: Healthy Beginnings: Innovative Managed Care Solutions for Opioid Use Disorder in Pregnancy

In 2014-2016, accidental overdose was the third leading cause of maternal death in Washington State. Pregnant people who use drugs experience disproportionate stigma and trauma. As non-medical pregnancy support people, doulas facilitate community connections and provide person-centered care. This session will examine how harm reduction doulas can improve outcomes for pregnant people who use substances.

PAX DreamMakers incorporates the best approaches from prevention science, using evidence-based kernels, continuously building resilience using protective factors while mitigating risk factors, and embracing their Indigenous culture and traditions.

4D: Intergenerational Trauma Through the Eyes of Media Karen Lizzy, LMHC, SUDP

We will look directly into the eyes of intergenerational trauma in the Native Community as revealed through newspaper articles, children's books, art, photo's, movies, documents, tv shows and music.

This workshop will discuss the role of Certified Peer Counselors in recovery by treating the whole person as a whole person. The learning objective is to understand how peer support reduces barriers, stigma, and shame by restoring hope, worth, and dignity in a recoveree's journey. The presentation will include a discussion on building a peer program at an OTP, the services peers provide, and sharing recoveree success stories.

5D: It's not just paying people to be abstinent: Reflections on Implementing Customized Contingency Management Programming

In this panel presentation, representatives from an intermediary purveyor organization, a statewide treatment agency, and two opioid treatment programs serving as implementing sites in Oregon will discuss collective efforts to design and implement customized Contingency Management (CM) programming to address simulant use. The panel discussion will encompass the goals of this multi-year project, implementation outcomes and experiences, and future considerations for CM implementation.

5E: Sharing Knowledge and Building Capacity: OHSU and Oregon ECHO Network's Addiction Medicine Programs

This presentation focuses on how our Addiction Medicine programs have leveraged the ECHO model to build the capacity of Oregon clinicians to identify and treat substance use disorders in their clinical setting. Starting in 2017, the Oregon ECHO Network partnered with the OHSU Department of Addiction Medicine to offer a single ECHO program and now offers nine separate ECHO programs: Substance Use Disorders in Ambulatory Care, Chronic Pain and Opioids, Effective Systems for Treating Addiction in Primary Care, Substance Use Disorders in Hospital Care, Hepatitis C: Treatment and Elimination, Hepatitis C Community of Practice, Substance Use Disorders Leadership, Addiction Medicine Curbsides and Conversations, and Recovery Peers in Medical Settings. The presentation will also describe how to obtain the Addiction Medicine ECHO Certificate and preview future Addiction Medicine ECHOs hosted by the Oregon ECHO Network.


#### Bree Guideline on Opioid Prescribing in Older Adults Dr. Mark Sullivan

This keynote will provide an overview of the Bree Guideline on Opioid Prescribing in Older Adults. The guideline was developed in 2022 by a multidisciplinary group of clinicians, administrators, and policymakers. In 2011, the Washington State Legislature established the Dr. Robert Bree Collaborative so that public and private health care stakeholders would have the opportunity to identify specific ways to improve health care quality, outcomes, and affordability in Washington State.
